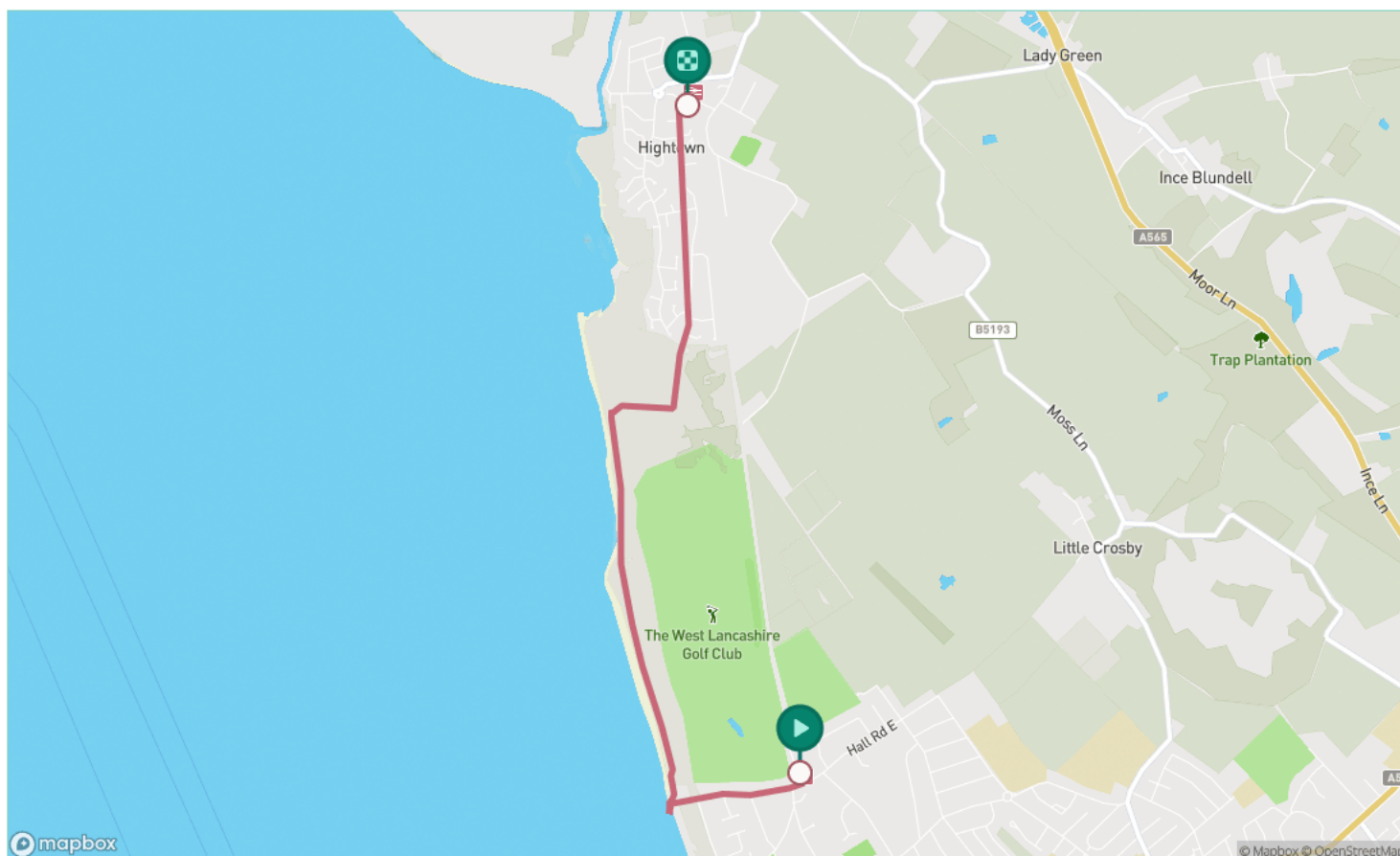

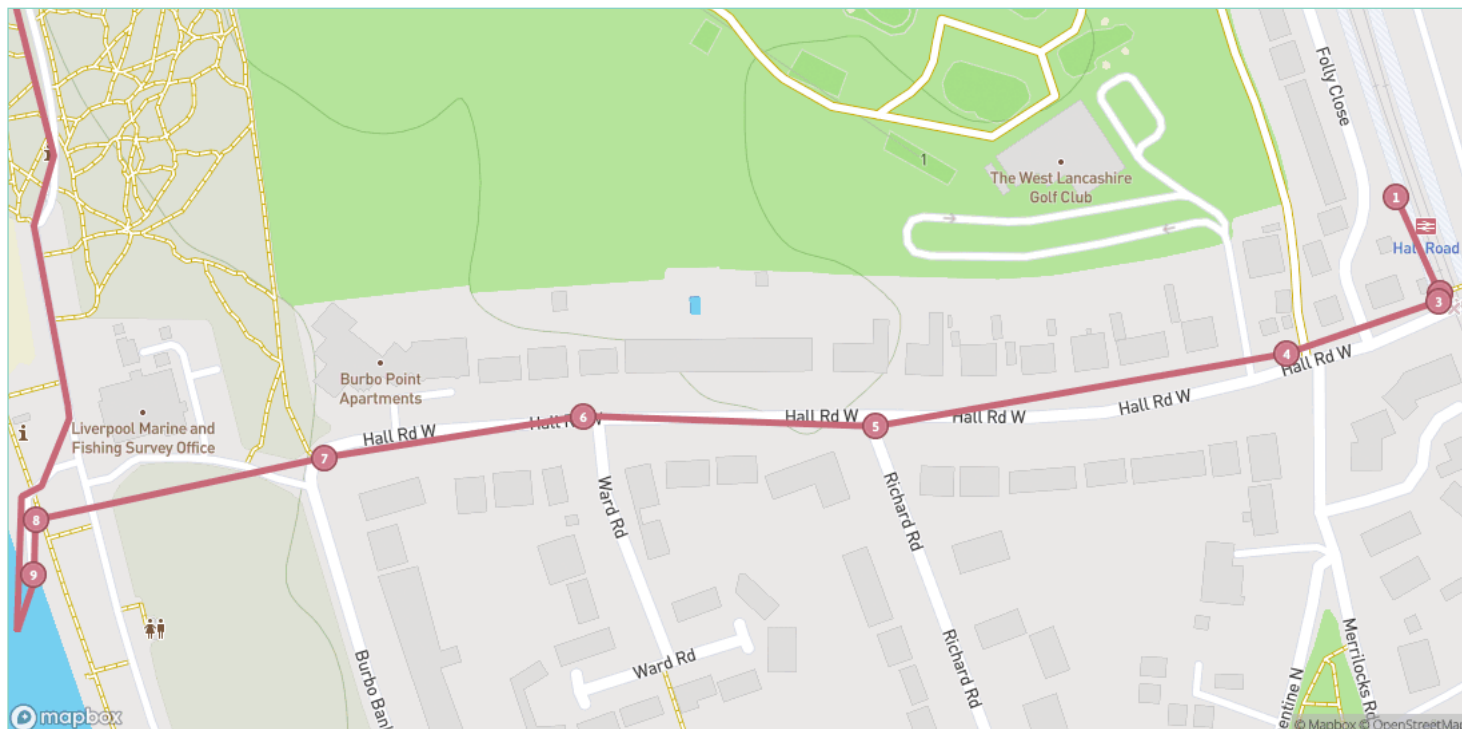

Step 1: Hello! We hope you're ready for a lovely new walk. Start this walk at Hall Road train station.

Step 8: Inside the car park, there's access to the beach.

Step 2: Look out for this blue plaque, which tells you about the Hall Road Station disaster.

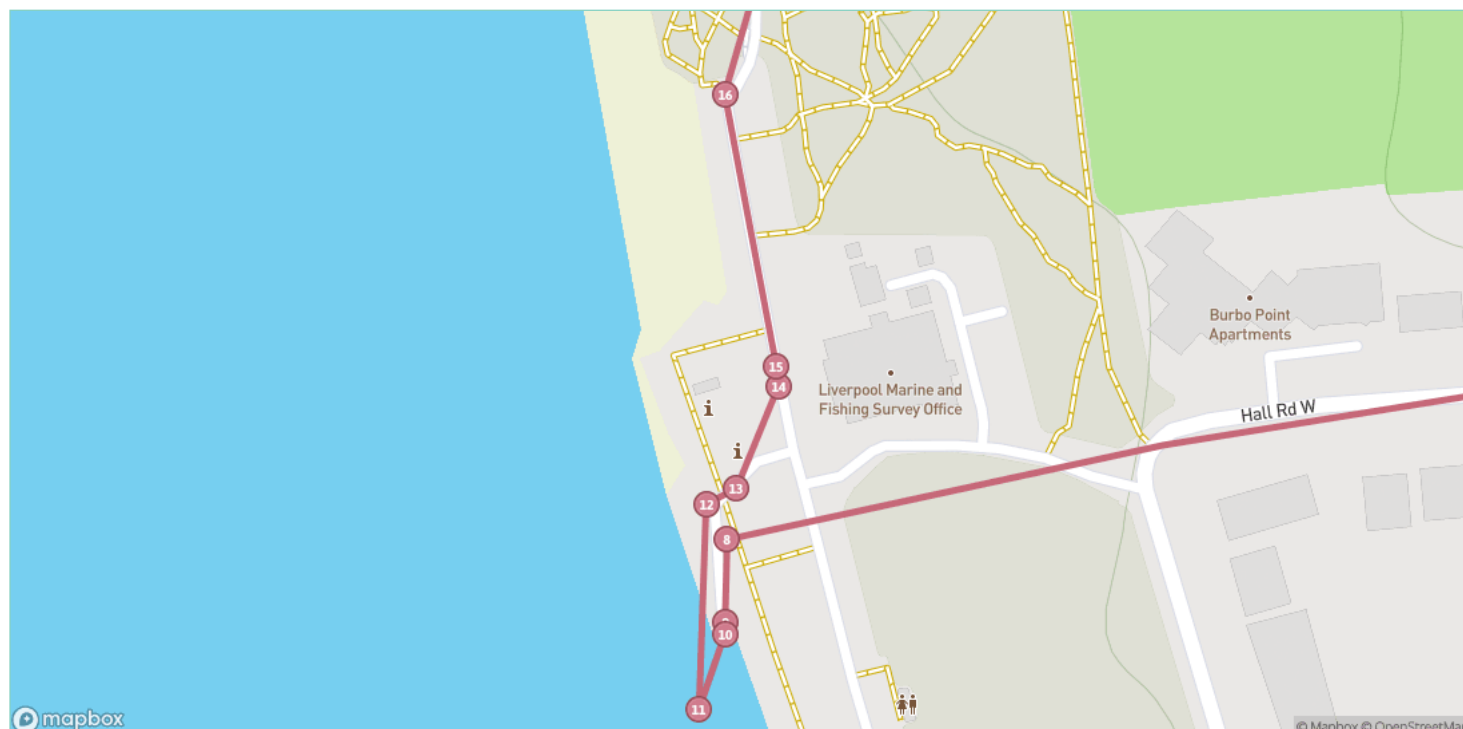
Step 3: Exit the station, turn right onto Hall Road West and continue walking ahead.

Step 4: Go past the sign for the West Lancashire Golf Club.

Step 5: On 17 June 1873 – The West Lancashire Golf Club was founded at a meeting in the Seaforth Hotel by seven members of Royal Liverpool Golf Club anxious to expand 'the Scottish national game' by bringing it across the River Mersey.

Step 6: Continue walking along Hall Road West.

Step 7: You'll soon reach a car park for Crosby Beach.



Step 9: Always be careful when walking on the beach. Check the tide times, and beware of wet and slippery sand.

Step 10: Check all the signs on the beach to make sure you have a safe visit!

Step 11: Here, you will see many Iron Men on the beach. These are statues made by Anthony Gormley.

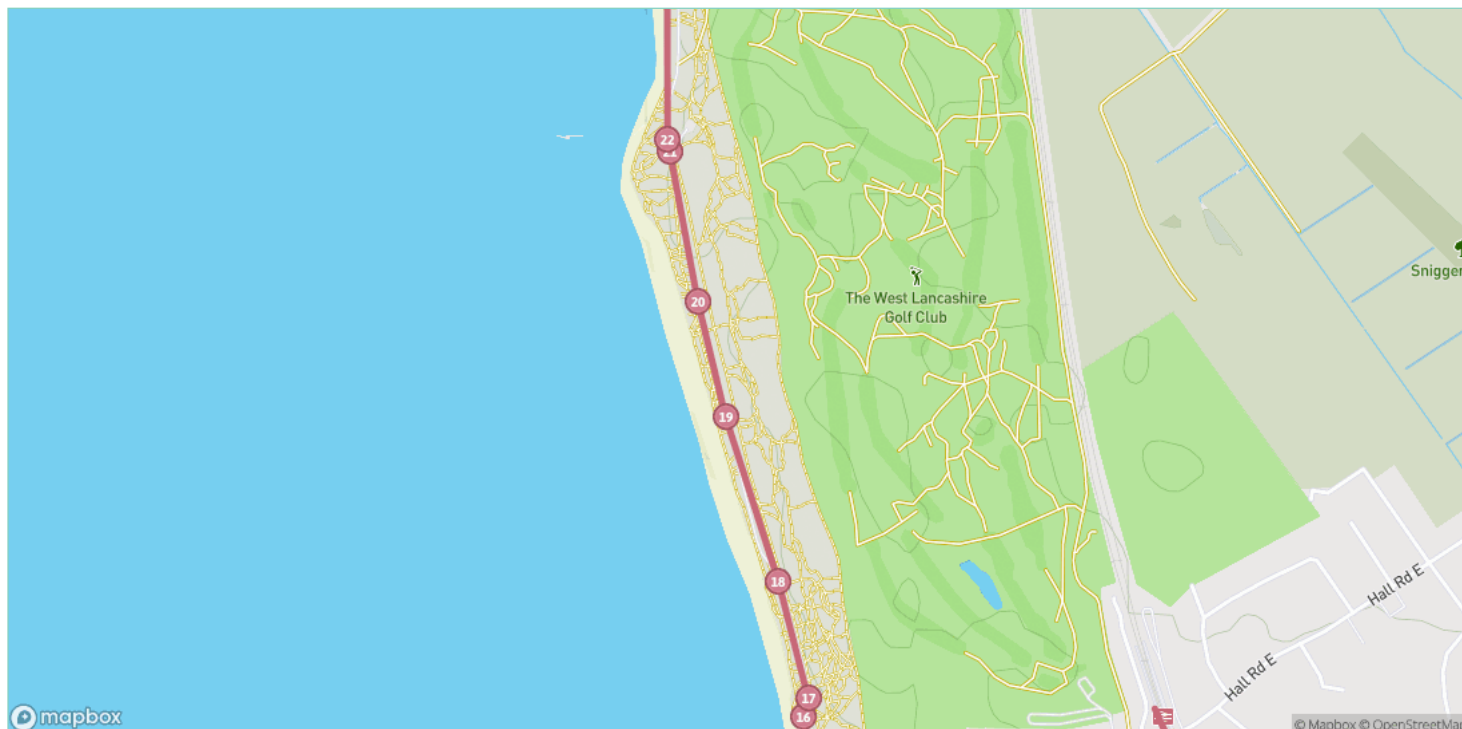
Step 12: In the car park there's lots of information about the statues!

Step 13: Anthony Gormley's installation Another Place on Crosby Beach features 100 life size cast iron figures spread across 3km of shoreline and stretching almost 1km out to sea.

Step 14: There also a coffee van and an ice cream van often parked if you fancy a drink or snack!

Step 15: You can see Wales in the distance.

Step 16: If you were to turn right as you walked into the car park, you'll reach a good section of the coastal path to walk alongside.



Step 17: It is part of the King Charles III England Coast Path.

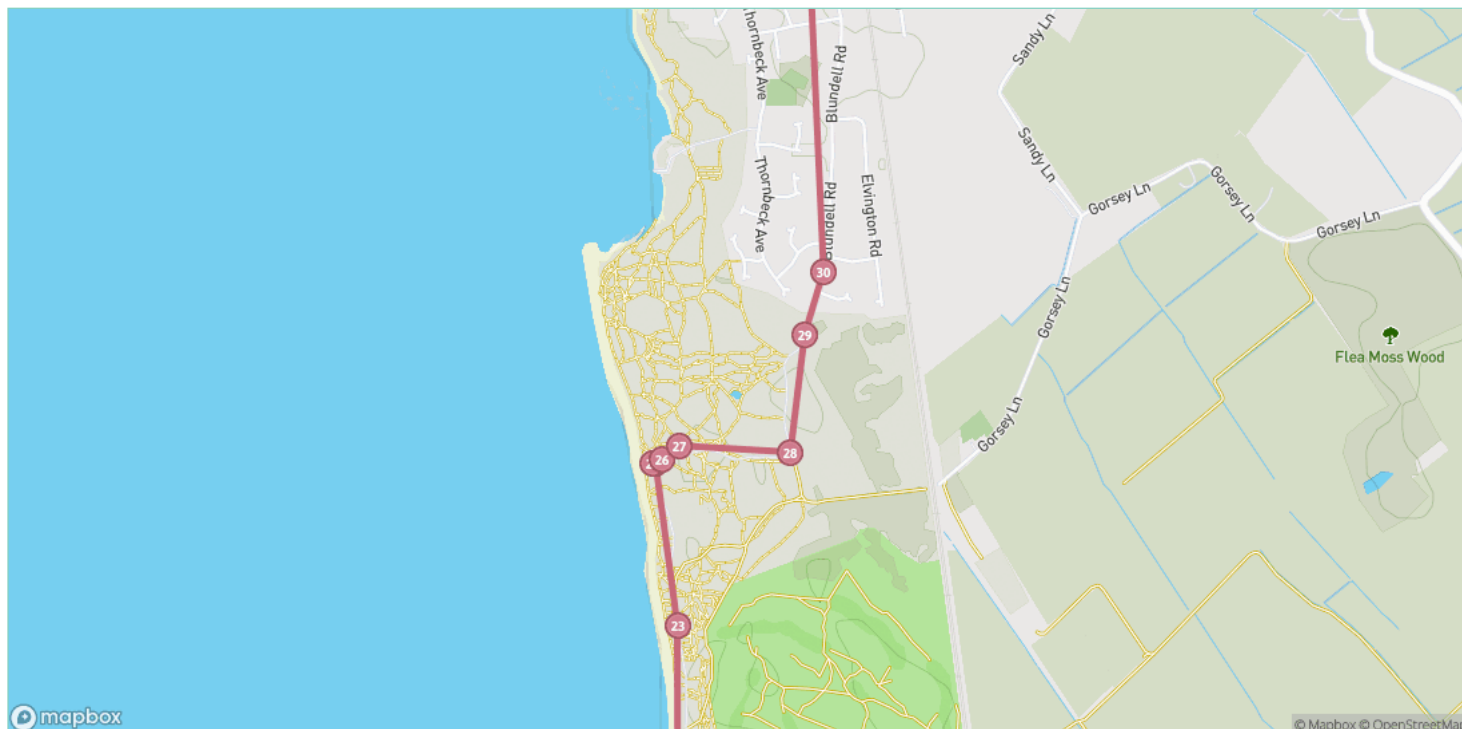
Step 18: Follow the path. The beach is to your left, and the dunes to your right!

Step 19: You can see the windmills in the distance.

Step 20: Also, have a look at the wildlife! Here are some pretty sweet peas in late summer. 🌸

Step 21: This is a coastal radar and surveillance mast, used to track boats and ships.

Step 22: Make sure you keep to the path.



Step 23: You will reach this sculpture.

Step 24: It is called pebble. It was produced in 2006 by Year 11 Pupils at Newfield School, Crosby, in memory of James Myers, a former pupil.

Step 25: You can see Formby in the distance!

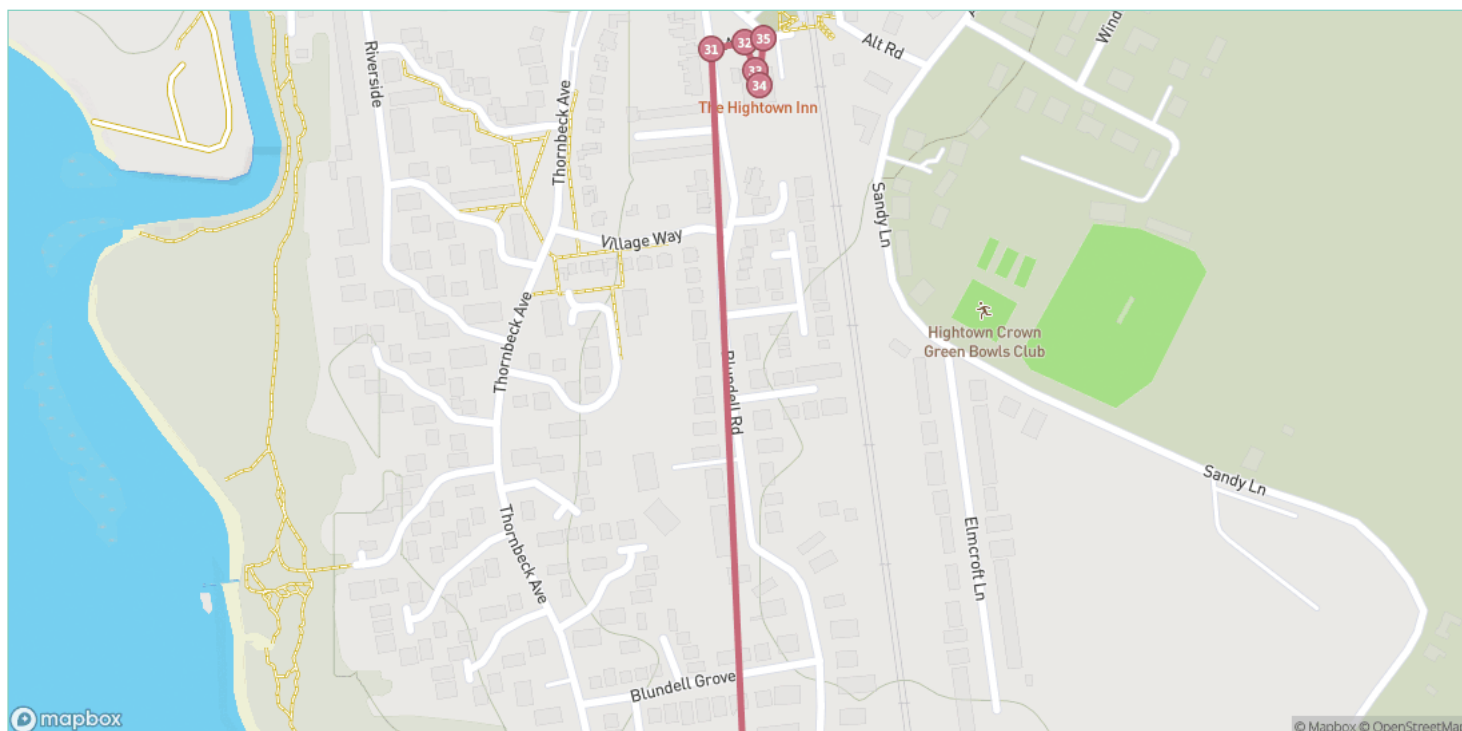
Step 26: Continue along the path to the right. Keep your eyes peeled, as wild deer are occasionally spotted along this path.

Step 27: We got lucky today! 🦌

Step 28: Stick to the path and continue as it bears left.

Step 29: At the end of the path, you will reach this gate. Go through it.

Step 30: Continue along Blundell Road.



Step 31: You'll soon reach Crosby Coffee Hightown. Stop off for a drink and a snack!

Step 32: Or, go next door to the Hightown Hotel.
