

## **Blaby District Heritage Walk 4**

A long, nature filled walk around Thurlaston. A great leg stretcher & a brilliant chance to to connect with nature.

Distance 12.9 kilometers / 8 miles

**Duration** 4 hours


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
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
**Step 1:** Your walk starts opposite the Elephant and Castle pub, on the junction of Main Street and Church Street.

**Step 2:** Turn right and walk along Main Street. You will pass Thurlaston Chapel, originally a Baptist Chapel, built in 1787 and rebuilt in 1842.

**Step 3:** Approaching the end of the houses before the Garden Centre, you will see what remains of a Victorian sewage stench pipe.

**Step 4:** Shortly before reaching the garden centre, take the footpath on the left.





**Step 5:** Continue along the footpath until you cross a small concrete bridge over the brook, then follow the field along the M69 motorway.

**Step 12:** Use the footpath to climb up the summit of Croft Hill. There is ample nature to be enjoyed here.

**Step 6:** Cross over the M69 using the farm track.

**Step 7:** Continue along the track until you reach a yellow-topped post, and bear right, following the hedge line before crossing Thurlaston Brook.


**Step 8:** Cross the footbridge over the Thurlaston Brook, a tributary of the River Soar.

**Step 9:** Follow the markers until you reach the exit on Thurlaston Lane.

**Step 10:** Turn left, following the road to Croft Hill.

**Step 11:** At the T-junction, turn left and you will see the entrance to the Croft Hill footpath.





**Step 13:** From the top of Croft Hill, you will see Croft Quarry. From here, turn right and come back down.

**Step 14:** From here, follow the footpath that runs alongside Huncote Road, until you reach the Marston Road junction. Cross over and continue.

**Step 15:** Cross over and walk along Marston Lane, continuing until you reach Stanton Lane.

**Step 16:** Cross Stanton Lane, walking along with narrow footpath towards Potters Marston.

**Step 17:** Continue straight following the footpath until you reach Dovecote Court Business Park.

**Step 18:** The business park is in the old Potters Marston village. All that remains is a small chapel and graveyard, and a few houses.

**Step 19:** Walk down the courtyard, following the way markers, and exit onto Pingle Lane, turning right.





**Step 20:** Cross over and take the footpath leading towards the M69 in the distance.

**Step 21:** Follow the hedgerow path, before reaching a green "private land" sign. Turn right at the yellow waymarker towards the M69.

**Step 22:** As you cross the wooden bridge over the stream, be aware there is an electric fence that runs alongside.

**Step 23:** Follow the path until you reach the bridge under the M69, then take the footpath immediately on the left.

**Step 24:** Continue to follow the waymarkers across the open fields. You'll have to head over wooden stiles here.





**Step 25:** You will eventually reach a gate, and on the right side there is a small gap. Go through this gap, turning right, walking along the drive.

**Step 26:** After a short walk you will reach a gate, go through and continue along the well-marked path.


**Step 27:** You will then come to a gate to the bridleway, continue on this path. This path runs alongside the embankment of the Earl Shilton bypass.

**Step 28:** On the left, there is an underpass. Ignore this and continue along the bridleway, straight ahead until you reach Mill Lane.

**Step 29:** Exit the bridleway, turning right onto Mill Lane. Be aware that this is a very narrow road with no pavement.

**Step 30:** Continue along Mill Lane, passing an equestrian centre and some disused workings from Barrow Hill Quarry.





**Step 31:** You will pass a small disused quarry filled with water.

**Step 32:** You will now pass a farm onto Pingle Lane. Turn left until you reach a T-junction. Caution, this is a narrow road with no pavement.


**Step 33:** At the T-junction, turn right down Watery Gate Lane.

**Step 34:** You will then cross the Thurlaston Brook, a tributary of the River Soar, once again.

**Step 35:** You will then get to a right-hand bend with a house in front of you. Take the driveway that runs alongside the left of this property.

**Step 36:** Continue down this path, passing Watery Gate Fishery.





**Step 37:** At the end of the footpath, just before Earl Shelton Lane, take the footpath to the right, sticking to the edges.

**Step 38:** Continue over the wooden stile with the "Bull in field" sign.

**Step 39:** You will enter a field, before reaching the road. Turn right towards Thurlaston. Be aware that this road is narrow with no pavement

**Step 40:** Continue towards Thurlaston, passing the church.

**Step 41:** You will now be back where to started the walk.
