

Itchen Navigation: Segment 2 of 3

The Itchen Navigation has so much to discover. This stretch from Shawford to Eastleigh is quiet and rural, a very lovely waterside ramble.

Distance 7.9 kilometers / 4.9 miles

Duration 3 hours





















Step 1: Welcome to Shawford! This is Section 2 of the Itchen Navigation which runs between Winchester and Southampton. This route ends at Eastleigh.

Step 2: Marco's is a wonderful café at Shawford, which was lovingly restored after 40 years by Three Rivers Community Rail Partnership.

Step 3: The Itchen Navigation is well sign-posted. As it follows the route of a waterway, the trail is mainly flat and level, however there are some locations with stiles, gates or gradients. Additionally, the route can get muddy and wet.

Step 4: Be sure you've packed plenty of water and snacks, and you're wearing good, comfortable walking shoes.


Step 5: Shawford is a rural country station. There's usually at least one Southwestern Railway train per hour from the north and south, so be sure to check the timetables before setting off.

Step 6: Head out of the station onto Shawford Road. Turn right and head down the right-hand side of the street, past the Chef and Brewer opposite.

Step 7: Keep going along the street until you reach the Itchen Navigation. Winchester is to the left, and Eastleigh is to the right. Turn right.

Step 8: The route starts along this flat, tarmac path.





Step 9: The Itchen Navigation, a channelised waterway formed from the Itchen River, is to your left.

Step 16: Cross over the Itchen Navigation and then turn right up ahead.

Step 10: Keep straight ahead. Go through the gate here where the tarmac path ends and becomes a dirt track.

Step 11: Depending on the season, you might encounter a bit of mud as you continue along the path here.


Step 12: The dirt footpath emerges out onto a paved road. There's very little vehicle traffic but be aware as you turn left to walk along the road.

Step 13: After a short stretch along the road, veer left to turn back onto the dirt path.

Step 14: Continue on. The ground is more uneven here and the path is narrower in places.

Step 15: When you come to the gate, walk past it and turn left.





Step 17: Walk past the metal gate here, noting the yellow Itchen arrow guiding your way.

Step 18: Head down the path to rejoin the water which is now to your right. Continue straight ahead.

Step 19: Keep following the dirt track along the fence as the path bears to the left away from the water.

Step 20: Follow the path as it then turns right here, walking along the much wider dirt track.


Step 21: The path narrows again into a dirt footpath straight ahead. Keep going along.

Step 22: Pass over the small stream that meets the Navigation just ahead to your right.

Step 23: A bit further on now, walk over the Itchen Navigation using the wide wooden bridge.

Step 24: We stopped here for several minutes, admiring the waterfall at the weir. Enjoy the sights and sounds of nature.





Step 25: On the other side of the bridge, go left down the smaller path.

Step 26: Rejoin the water here. The path once again runs alongside the Itchen Navigation.

Step 27: Pass through the waterworks area here, continuing straight ahead along the water as you pass by the fences. There's a paved ramp here.

Step 28: Past the waterworks on the other side, the route returns to feeling quiet and natural.


Step 29: If you're lucky, you might spot some wildflowers here - the snowdrops were in bloom in February when we walked.

Step 30: This stretch of the route can be tricky - you might encounter mud, flooding, or very uneven and slippery segments. Tread very carefully.

Step 31: We carefully climbed over the sticks placed down over the water here, for example. Take care as you tread.

Step 32: The river bends right, and the path follows it. Continue alongside the water's edge, ignoring any paths into the woods to the right.





Step 33: There was more thick mud here and the path was quite narrow.

Step 34: Despite the mud, we loved this stretch. It felt so quiet and secluded, even with a fair number of other walkers about.

Step 35: Stay straight ahead following the river as it gently meanders, keeping the water to your left.

Step 36: The Itchen Navigation is a linear nature reserve, a pleasant landscape where the waterway is in natural harmony with its surroundings.


Step 37: There are relics of the industrial past to admire, like locks and weirs that were used to control the water levels.

Step 38: Continue straight onto the boardwalk.

Step 39: Off the boardwalk, keep going along the dirt path which is narrow here. There are some low hanging branches too.

Step 40: At Kiln Lane, turn left to walk briefly along it. Take care and stop to notice vehicle traffic.





Step 41: Carefully walk along the road just to cross the channel. The turn right to head down back to the water on the opposite side.

Step 47: Continuing on, watch your head on overhanging branches...

Step 42: If you're in need of refreshments, continue down Kiln Lane to Brambridge Park Garden Centre which has a cafe.


Step 43: Back on the path, the sound of the road already fading. The path is muddy here and narrow with some low hanging branches.

Step 44: Along this stretch, you'll see the Itchen Navigation to your right and the Itchen River to your left. Head over the small wooden bridge.

Step 45: The Navigation was created to transport heavy or bulky freight from the ships docked at Southampton, inland to Winchester.

Step 46: On the opposite side of the water, wave hello to the alpacas and, beyond, the Southwestern Railway trains.





Step 48: ... and tread carefully across any trail flooding and uneven surfaces. There are many tree roots along this stretch.

Step 54: It's very green and natural on this side of the water, but you'll start to see more buildings on the opposite side as we approach Eastleigh.

Step 49: After many years of decay, the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust has spent much time restoring footpaths along the navigation.


Step 50: When you come to Highbridge Road, you're more than halfway done! Excellent job so far. Carefully cross to the other side when it's clear.

Step 51: Head straight, down the small slope, and back onto the path along the water. It's stunning with the sun coming through the trees.

Step 52: The route bends to the right, following the navigation under the railway line. The path is less muddy through the tunnel.

Step 53: There are various plants, trees, flowers, birds, water creatures, and insects to discover. If you're lucky, you might even spot a deer.





Step 55: Keep going along the dirt track as the water meanders to the left.

Step 62: Keep going along the path. The landscaped has changed to marshy grassland.

Step 56: Here, ignore the bridge to your right and continue straight ahead.

Step 57: Pass underneath the railway once more by heading through the tunnel.


Step 58: Out the other side, you're approaching Eastleigh now.

Step 59: At the metal footbridge, cross to the other side of the Itchen Navigation and then turn left to continue on.

Step 60: This path is popular with families and dogs out enjoying the walk by the waterway.

Step 61: Depending on the weather, you might encounter more mud and flooding on this stretch.





Step 63: Follow the path as it twists and turns along the water's edge.

Step 64: Head through the former stile and kissing gate.

Step 65: Can you hear any birds calling? In some places, they might be so loud it's hard to miss them. What can you spot?

Step 66: Come to this small bridge. The Barton River meets The Itchen here, and there are many branches heading in different directions ahead.


Step 67: Our route continues straight. We loved this impressive row of trees standing guard over the path. There's a recreation ground behind them.

Step 68: Why not stop and admire the rushing water on this stretch? How does the sound make you feel?

Step 69: The route is now paved the rest of the way.

Step 70: Take in your final views of the Itchen on this route, as it's now time to head into Eastleigh.





Step 71: When you intersect with Bishopstoke Road, turn right. The Itchen Navigation continues across the other side - for another day!

Step 78: At the junction, follow the pavement to the left to join Station Hill road.

Step 72: Carefully cross over to the opposite side of Bishopstoke's Road using the median islands here. Turn right on the opposite side to continue.

Step 73: Follow the pavement along the road almost all the way to Eastleigh Station.


Step 74: Cross over one of the legs of the Itchen that branched off earlier - the Barton River.

Step 75: Keep going along the pavement, passing opposite the Steam Town Brew Co., an excellent post-walk refreshment stop, if you fancy.

Step 76: Keep going up the slope.

Step 77: Cross over the railway lines once more, this time over the tracks.





Step 79: Keep going just a bit further to reach the station on your left.

Step 80: Eastleigh Station marks the end of this walk. From here, you can catch a Southwest train to London, Southampton, Salisbury, and Portsmouth.

Step 81: As you head back to Shawford or elsewhere along the Southwestern Railway network, we hope you enjoyed this walk today! We know we did. Where will you walk next? Section 3 of the Itchen Navigation is ahead.
